From its foundation in 1898, the Fed has remained the popular name for the S.W.M.F., which, in 1945, became the South Wales Area of the N.U.M. The core of this full-length history is the momentous period from the General Strike of 1926 to the Nationalization of the mines in January 1947. To this, the authors add a stimulating and perhaps controversial, final chapter assessing the achievements and problems of the nationalised industry, and the role of the miners in the upsurge of industrial militancy that characterised the seventies. *illustrated hardback £12.95*

For the authors in this volume bourgeois democracy is not a question of the past, but a vital, pressing, contemporary issue for Marxists raising problems that challenge orthodoxy. Instead it emphasises the 'relative autonomy' of politics from economics, and the importance of the expansion of democracy under capitalism as a precondition for the struggle for socialism. 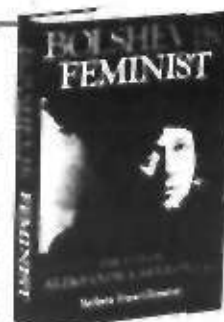
