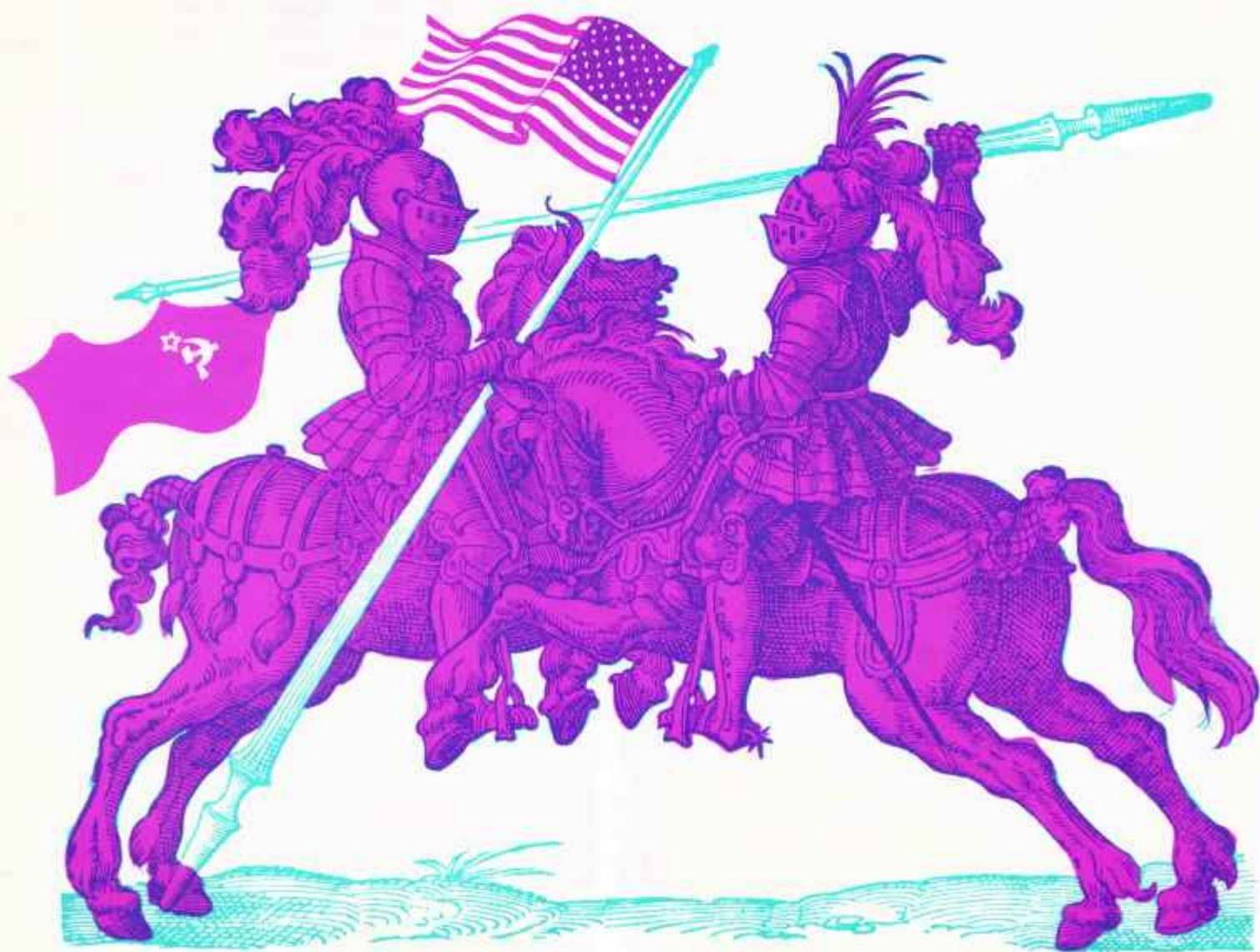

### Britain's Crisis — Modes of Analysis

In recent years there have been important moves on the Left towards a more concrete understanding of the historical crisis of British capitalism. The course attempts to explore some of the most important themes of this analysis and to define with more precision its implications for strategy.

- 1 **The historical sources of British decline:** what factors explain the increasing weakness of British capital?
- 2 **The labour movement's response:** why have opportunities been missed? Has the movement failed to understand the need for economic and social regeneration?
- 3 **Britain and the world economy:** what constraints are imposed by the present international crisis? How can Britain avoid a subordinate position in the international division of labour?
- 4 **Industrial change:** what are the priorities in the regeneration of British industry and what are the main barriers to be overcome?
- 5 **The challenge of modernisation:**
  - (a) the Right — can a neo-liberal strategy succeed? What would follow a failure of the Thatcher/Joseph policies?
  - (b) the Left — do we offer a practicable alternative? Why have left policies failed to win mass support?

### Ideology and Culture

This course is intended to provide for some recapping of the more significant theoretical developments around the concept ideology and for a series of estimations of the positive contributions which have been made. It is hoped that as far as debate is concerned this be shifted to where it should always have been, namely on the question of strategy.

- 1 **Survey of the field:** what has been gained since the moment of *Culture and Society*? What in R. Williams' view are the most productive formulations?
- 2 **Concept of 'Ideology':** a session based on Jorge Larraín's extremely useful book.
- 3 **Screen — an estimation:** an estimation of the contribution of the work of the journal *Screen*.
- 4 **Theories of discourse:** the problem of tackling ideology reproduction and the contribution of theories of discourse.
- 5 **Ideological refusals:** the politics of insubordination.
- 6 **Feedback**

### Thatcherism: What Is To Be Done?

This course is based on the theory that Thatcherism is a radical break with all previous post-war Conservatism. It examines the proposition that Thatcherism is an outright and all-out attempt to swing the balance of opinion in Britain towards the right. In ideological terms, Thatcherism is the counter-revolution which is attempting to reverse all the ideological gains since World War 2. If this is true then what must the Left now do? Even if trade union militancy defeats Thatcher, as to some extent it defeated Heath, will this secure victory for the Left in the long term?

- 1 **The meaning of Thatcherism.**
- 2 **Thatcherism — a principled position:** this will be a discussion of Thatcherism compared to previous post-war Conservative philosophies.
- 3 **Thatcherism — monetarist economics in action:** this will be an examination of the economics of Thatcherism, assessing how far Thatcher demands for free collective bargaining and economic freedom for the poor, is part of a genuine philosophy and how far it is political tactics and demagoguery.
- 4 **The fightback:** in this session we will discuss the problems and prospects for fighting Thatcherism. Speakers will draw from the experience of current struggles and attempt to discuss the question 'What way now for the Left?'
