Request for Applications

The Armament and Disarmament Information Unit (ADIU) at the University of Sussex and the University of California Institute of Global Conflict and Cooperation (IGCC) announce an intensive programme to interest and further inform university and higher education staff and graduate students on issues connected with international security, peace and arms control.

The specific purpose of the Summer School is to prepare participants to teach in these subject areas. Applicants may wish to extend or enhance existing courses or create entirely new ones. There are twenty places available for those with institutional affiliations in Europe. The 1988 Summer School will be held on the University of Sussex campus. It will begin on Friday 8 July and end on Tuesday 19 July. Participants will be expected to stay for the entire period and will be required to live at the University of Sussex. Participants will receive free room and board, travel expenses and a stipend.

Visiting scholars and practitioners will address the participants on such topics as the Origins and Interpretations of the Cold War; Deterrence Theory; Arms Control; Alliance Strategies; Alternative Defence Policies; Military Technology and the Economy; Third World Security Issues; Language and the Cold War; and New Political Developments in the United States, the Soviet Union and Europe. There will also be sessions on Course Design and Teaching Methods.

Applicants are asked to submit by 10 April 1988 a recent brief *curriculum vitae* and a single sheet of paper which must contain the following information:

1. Name.

3. Work and home telephone numbers.
4. Academic title (graduate students must submit a letter from their supervisors).
5. Academic discipline.
6. Related courses already taught: When initiated? Frequency? Lecture or Seminar? Undergraduate or graduate? (Graduate students please list relevant courses taken.)
7. Related courses you plan or intend to teach for which the summer school would be relevant: When to be offered? Level? Frequency? Would the course be part of your regular teaching commitment? What deadline for university/departmental approvals would a new or revised course have to meet?

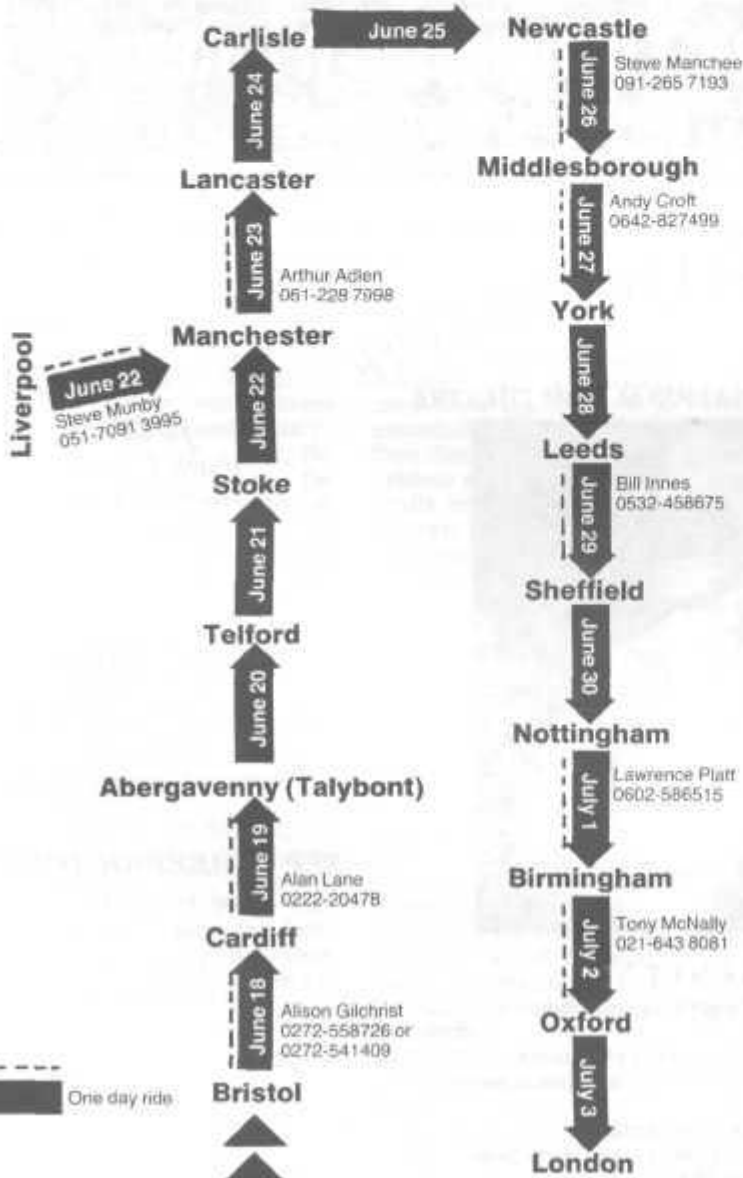

1381-1988 THE POLL TAXES AND THE PEASANTS REVOLT

1988 will see the introduction of a Poll Tax for the first time since 1381. In the reign of King Richard II the tax caused an explosion of rage against the King's Government.
