It is appropriate that in this year, the 350th anniversary of De Ruyter's birth, an English historian should pay tribute to the genius of a traditional enemy. This book combines in an unusual way the study of economic and strategic history. It illuminates the relationship between naval power and commercial expansion and rescues from virtual oblivion some of those who, like Sir George Downing, helped to shape England's economic destiny. Mr. Wilson does not moralise over his theme, which remains strictly historical, but his working model of power politics and national economic rivalries will interest all students of international affairs. The study is based on a comprehensive survey of sources, Dutch and European as well as English.
